

Session 1

Warm-up

Begin with statements and questions about the students:

I drink coffee. Do you drink coffee?

I like dogs. Do you like dogs?

I don't play computer games. Do you play computer games?

Show the students the picture of Moby's dog. Ask students what we have to do when we have a dog.

Help students come up with the new words and write them on the board:

dog / wash / walk / live / yard / name / every day / bite /
fight / usually / sometimes / brave

Ask the class questions about raising dogs. Try and use the new words in both the guestions and answers.

For example: Do you wash your dog? Where do dogs sleep?
Where does your dog sleep? Who walks your dog?
Why does a dog need a name? Do dogs fight?

Write some of these questions on the board. Ask the students what words appear in all these questions. Elicit do/does or the present simple question form. Students come to the board to underline each do/does.

Check Homework

Go over the homework from the previous lesson (L1U4L2).

Movie

First Viewing:

- a. Tell students they're about to watch the movie about Moby's new dog. The movie has many questions.
- b. Watch the movie.
- c. Ask students if they can remember 1 or 2 of the questions.
- d. Which of the new words appears in the questions (see underlined words below).

Second viewing:

- a. Pairs are assigned one of the new words mentioned in the questions.
- b. While watching the movie again, pairs have to look out for "their" question and memorize it.
- c. Now pairs ask the questions, one taking the part of Ben (asking the question) and the partner taking Moby's part and making up an answer.

Questions:

- 1. Does he bite?
- 2. Does he <u>live</u> in the <u>yard</u>?
- 3. Does he live in the house?
- 4. Do you go out for a <u>walk</u> in the park every day?
- 5. What does he eat?
- 6. Where does he <u>usually</u> sleep?
- 7. When do you wash the dog?
- 8. Who helps you?
- 9. Is he brave?



Session 1 (cont.)

Practice Ask the students to give you five new words from this lesson/movie

and list them on the board. Ask them to form questions using the words.

Students work on specified features from this lesson at the teacher's

discretion. Allot 15 minutes for this activity.

Homework Collect the homework assignment from the previous lesson (L1U4L2).

Ask students to learn the three sentences in **Write It** for a dictation.

They should be able to answer the two questions in **Read It**.

Sum-up Ask the students to form questions with the following words:

a. brave

b. a dog

c. live

d. walk

e. name

f. Fighter

g. wash



Session 2

Dictation

Slowly dictate twice the three sentences from **Write It** that the students studied.

- a. Do you go out for a walk every day?
- b. Fighter walks to the phone when he hears it.
- c. Does she know the right answer?

Practice

Write a few questions on the board with the words in incorrect order. Ask students to create questions and answer them.

- a. you / What / do / food / like /?
- b. does / Moby / ? / the / When / dog / wash
- c. ? / the / live / Where / dog / does
- d. walks / dog / with / the /? / Who
- e. you / dogs / Do / like / ?

A different way to do this:

Write each word from the sentences on a different piece of construction paper or card stock. Keep each sentence separate; you can color code them. Pass out the cards and have the students stand in front of the class, one sentence at a time, arranging themselves in the correct order.

Students work on specified features from this lesson at the teacher's discretion. Allot 15 minutes for this activity.

Homework

- 1. Put the words in the right order to make questions.
 - a. My friend Ed plays the bass. does / practice / When / he /?

He practices every day.

b. play / he / Does / drums / too / the /?

No, he doesn't.

c. plays / band / Who / in / the / the / drums /?

Moby does.

d. do / you / What / play /?

I play the guitar.

e. do / the / Nikki / What / in / does / band /?

She sings. She's our singer.

Homework (cont.)

2. Look at the table. Complete all the questions and answers. All the verbs are in the base form. Remember to make any necessary changes.

One-word time expressions (sometimes, often) may have different places in the sentence:

Often, Ben washes Fighter. Ben often washes Fighter. Ben washes Fighter often.

	every day	sometimes	often
Ben	go to school	swim	practice with the band
Ben and Moby		play basketball	practice with the band
Nikki	go to school		sing with the band

For example: When does Ben swim? Ben swims sometimes.

Sum-up

Pantomime characters and issues from the movie, and have the students guess. Call on the students to pantomime.

Suggested prompts:

Fighter / wash / bite / walk / brave / Nikki



Warm-up	Check the homework assignment. With the help of prompts, ask a few students to create questions. Suggested prompts: do, does, what, when, where, why, who Pictures of: Fighter, Ben and Moby, Nikki			
Practice	Show a picture or poster with lots of action. Ask students to come up with questions about the picture. Allot 5 minutes for this activity. Students work on specified features from this lesson at the teacher's discretion. Allot 15 minutes for this activity.			
Game	Pairs sit facing each other. Each student receives a copy of the same story with either even or odd numbered phrases missing. The aim is to ask questions in order to obtain the missing information. Students fill in the information that they learn from their partners. For example: Moby makes good What does Moby make? (pizzas)
